## Thunder favourites after Mavs defeat

Thunder have one firm hand on the trophy after beating Mavericks in the top -of-the-table clash last week. Mavs have now lost two games to Thunder's one-their previous meeting back in May-and Thunder can even afford to lose one of their remaining three games with a head-to-head lead over the Mavs on runs aggregate over the two games. Thunder led from start to finish and came out 14-5 on top after $61 / 2$ innings. Greensox remain rooted to the bottom of the standings after narrowly losing to the Sharks in a relatively low-scoring encounter: trailing for five
innings, they tied it up at $8-8$ in the top of the 6 th, but were unable to hold off the maneaters with their home advantage, and lost 11-10. Their fel-low-strugglers, the Speeders, met their match in the Camels who "mercied" them in five innings. The bottom two both have rescheduled games in hand, but neither looks likely to catch 3rd-bottom Meerkats, who had a good win against Mayhem putting them level with Sharks on 5-8.

The league's only unbeaten team came mighty close to losing their per-

## No home team in Div 4

In Division 4, next week sees the first game of the three-game playoff between the top two for the title. Meanwhile the other three teams play a three-way round-robin. The 'v' rather than '@' in the schedule indicates 'no home team': teams toss up at the start to decide home advantage. The team listed second is responsible for setting out the pitch and should provide one new and one used 11" ball while the team listed first will provide 12" balls.

## On this day ...

On August 9th 2000, Renegades beat Mavericks 8-7 after ten innings, their first and only defeat of the year. The record of three extra innings stood until 2017 when a game between Mavs and Dodgers went to 11 innings.
Fast forward to 2006 when, in the penultimate week of the season, Mavericks beat 2nd-place Dodgers to secure the title. A week later they would beat Greensox to complete a second consecutive perfect season ( 28 wins) which they would extend to 32 before eventually losing five games into the following season: this is of course still a record. Dodgers were runners-up for the third, and so far last, time in their long history.

In more recent history (well, 12 years ago), on this date Drizzle (nowadays Thunder II) beat their erstwhile bogey team, Meerkats, for the first time on their way to the Division 3 title. The 12-team division was split into three groups of four for the last few weeks of the
season. In the middle section, Tigers (who have since then morphed into the Travelling Dodgers, at least for the purposes of MSL statistics) were losing to Enforcers, while Mayhem beat the Hurricanes (now Thunder III).

And so to 2017, when on this date Bats beat Storm to secure the Div 3 title, Hackers, already assured promotion from Div 4, beat Titans while the eventual champions, the short-lived Rebels, beat the Barflies. 2017 was the inaugural year of MSL's Division 5. On this date Colt 45s beat the Meteors: both teams merged with Thunder IV in later years. Enforcers beat the Blue Jays, while Freeze beat the Vipers.
On the same day, in Washington DC, a giant inflatable chicken resembling Donald Trump was placed outside the White House as a political protest. Not really relevant to MSL but it nicely fills an otherwise blank space.

Titans proved once again that nine can beat ten, winning despite an auto out in the line-up against Thunder II. Both are 7-7 for the season with two games to go and could easily end up in a three-way tie in midtable with Mavs II, who were resting last week.
In the Division 3 title race Stingers dropped back half a game by dint of resting. Screwballs were involved in a tight low-scoring affair against the Sluggababes. ## When teams are tied

Mike Lott wrote to Bases Loaded this week asking "How does the head-tohead work? Last week you mentioned that Thunder needed to win by six to take a head-tohead lead over the Mavs in case they lost their game in hand." That was actually a mistake: Mavs beat Thunder by two runs, so three, not six, was the winning margin Thunder needed. Mike went on to point out that in the first game Mavs still had a 'bat in hand', since they were at home, and the game ended after 612 innings. "So how does that get taken into account?" he asks.

Mike of course knew what the rules say, as they are clearly stated in the Captain's Handbook. When teams are tied with the same overall win-loss record, their head-to-head record determines league position. If they have each won one and lost one (a situation that never used to arise when teams played each other three times), the aggregate score in their games against each other is the next deciding criterion. Mike's point is that Mavs lost the opportunity to
win the first game by more than two by dint of being the home team, and being denied a seventh inning.
Mike presented a scenario where, in a title deciding game, the team having lost the first game as the away team by, say, two runs, found itself now the home team, level after $61 / 2$ innings and so unable to win the title because as soon as they scored one, the game would be over, won by a lesser margin, despiute bats 'in hand'. This would be especially frustrating if the winning hit would have batted in sufficient runs, for them to simply not count.

There are two things to say about this. First, the losing team have done enough to deserve the title by restricting their opponents to a sufficiently narrow win. But more important, in softball, like cricket, the aim is to outscore your opponents. Because the game is over as soon as you reach your target, the margin of victory is not really relevant, which is why runs scored/ conceded is only a last resort for separating two teams. But how else could we manage it?

## Todgers' European adventure

The Travelling Dodgers were making their way to Sofia, Bulgaria last weekend to compete in the 2023 European Co-ed Slowpitch Super Cup that started on Monday. They earned their place in the competition as 2021 national champions. They will be part of a 13 -team competition, representing eight different countries: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechia, Germany, Great Britain, Ireland and the Netherlands. The 2022 national champions, H 2 O , are also representing GB.

Travelling Dodgers are in a group of seven teams, playing a full round-robin against Waynes Pardubice (Czechia), Beveren Reapers (Belgium), BSC Buffaloes (Bulgaria), Hangarounds (Germany), Dodder Dynamoes (Ireland) and Tex Town TigersEastpro (Netherlands). If they manage to finish in the top three they will progress to a further sixteam round-robin with the top two meeting in the final next Saturday.

The Todgers' nationals squad is a mix of MSL players and others, with Manchester-based players forming the majority. Fa-

miliar names on the 12player roster are Jonathan Huck (captain), Dan Downes, Sam Steele, Rachael Shkurko, Sherry Kenyon, Katie Jessop, and former MSL player Areej Elmaazi.

Jonathan Huck said, "It has been a big learning curve ahead of the tournament, but I must thank the BSF, all the umpires going from the UK, and Roger Grooms of H2O for all reaching out to me at various times to help, guide and support me through the complexities of participating in this competition.
"What I think is really amazing about this whole journey is that several of us have been playing for Travelling Dodgers since

2016, when we were essentially a B-grade softball team. I think this is often under-appreciated.
"The team is buzzing with excitement," Jonathan added, "and the group chat has been non-stop all week in the lead-up to the tournament. My main job whilst there is to serve the players and take care of players anding so that they can focus on their softball and on having a good time in Bulgaria. "It took us six years to qualify for the European Cup, so we know just how hard it is to do that. And there is simply no point being there unless your aim is to win it!" After playing they wouldn't say there was much difference from a Division 1 team in Manchester or NSL 2 standard, and despite the Odd Balls captain Brianna apologising repeatedly for playing "sub par" the pair felt like they managed to represent our (for now) home league very well. However, neither of us seemed to be gunning for the elite leagues...fear can get the best of you!

$7 \& 3$. This ensures all teams can field a team regularly where a lack of women is often the case. [Ed's note, no chance of MSL going back to the dark ages ;) ]

No batters boxes: we found this very strange, but this is often a field by field thing, with the batter having two feet leeway (as the Blu sees it) from the front of the plate to step forward for a hit.
Blus don't stand behind the catcher: for a lefthanded batter, the Blus position themselves to the rear right-hand side
but USSSA bats. The ball doesn't come off the bat as hard as USSSA balls would, and it creates both a challenge for the batter to hit bigger, thus speeding up the game, while also it's another safety feature.

No helmets for batters but compulsory helmets or face guards for pitchers.

Five-run limit per inning, to speed up games, ensure seven innings are played and ensure that double headers can be completed. We did note however that the games
lasted for a similar length of time to those in the MSL while also it kept things competitive.

No running over home plate: you run behind the plate and there are no tags at home. All outs at home are like force-outs. Tagging at home is played at tournaments and Elite levels but to avoid collisions and injuries it has been removed from the non-elite divisions.

No batting order or fielding position requirements based on gender. But females are allowed to bunt.

Overall, it was a great experience for us and a fantastic way of getting involved with our new community of slowpitch enthusiasts! We would both actively encourage anyone headed to Canada or somewhere with a softball league to get stuck in and try out playing on foreign soil. We both wanted to put out a huge thanks to the Odd Balls for their kind hospitality and the friendly and encouraging way in which they brought us in. Next stop will be the "Snow Pitch" league when we are visiting again in December... very cold but lots of sliding by the sounds of things!

## Public Liability Insurance explained

This article is designed to explain the Public Liability Insurance that the British Softball Federation provides for its member teams, including all MSL teams. This insurance is mandatory but is included in the annual affiliation fees that teams pay.
BSF Public Liability Insurance cover runs each year from 2nd April to 1st April of the following year. The Limit of Indemnity on the BSF's Public Liability insurance is $£ 10$ million. Each claim is subject to an excess of $£ 250$, to be paid by the claimant-i.e. the BSF member team making the claim- with some exceptions under Criminal Damage and Pollution.

The BSF's Public Liability insurance covers affiliated members should something happen to a member of the public or if property damage occurs, such as a home run smashing a window or

Should your team or league wish to hire venues, indoor or outdoor, you may be required to provide a copy of the BSF's Public Liability Insurance certificate before the hire will be confirmed. This can be obtained by contacting the BSF at the above email address.

The BSF understands that some players may play for multiple teams and these players may wonder why they need to pay affiliation fees to each of their teams. The reason is that the BSF team affiliation fee does not only cover insurance, which is a very small

part of the fee, but also provides membership of the national governing body that regulates, organises, promotes and supports softball in the UK in a variety of ways, including the management of safeguarding, inclusivity and antidoping. The reason that the BSF's Public Liability insurance is per team is that there is currently no nationwide individual player registration in softball, as there is in many other sports, although we do have such a system in place here in Manchester.

An incident report form, which must be filled in before a claim can be made, is available through the BSF website. Go to
'Resources' (www.british softball.org/resources), then click on 'Insurance \& Incident Reporting', which takes you through to the BSUK website as they administer insurance claims on the BSF's behalf. Scroll down to the bottom of the page for a link to the Incident Report Form and an email address to use to begin the process of making a claim.
